Where in Jackson County is LJC?

Follow along with this year's LJC class as they travel around Jackson County! We'll share spotlights of the places visited as well as highlights of the organizations that meet with the class of '25.

Jackson County Chamber was originally known as the Farmer's Club, the first of its kind in the U.S. Essentially operating as a community center for farmers and their families when they came into town for the day, the building was host to many community events through the years. It became the Seymour Chamber of Commerce in 1931, and since 2021, has been expanded to support businesses throughout the county as the Jackson County Chamber. The mission of the Jackson County Chamber is "to be a membership organization connecting, building and growing our members, businesses, partners and community,"

Jackson County Courthouse was built in 1870 and remodeled in 1911. The clock tower caught fire after a lightning strike and had to be reconstructed in 1959-1960. The building is on the National Register of Historic Places. Behind the courthouse is the Jackson County Judicial Center which was completed in 2018 and houses Jackson Superior Court I and II as well as Jackson Circuit Court and several government offices.



Jackson County Visitor Center is not just for tourists! The building was once a train depot in Seymour, but currently houses a small museum dedicated to Jackson County's history, a gift shop with local items, and a team of staff that can help visitors and locals learn more about Jackson County attractions and events. Their website is also a great resource and is home to an events calendar with everything happening around the county.

Judge Robert Brown Jackson Juvenile Home

Serves adolescent boys who have been declared CHINS (children in need of services) or delinquent by the court system. Residents receive therapeutic care and treatment at the facility, attend public school at Brownstown Central, and are encouraged to participate in extracurricular activities both through the school and in the community. Families of residents are also encouraged to be involved with services to work toward reunification when possible and older youth are enrolled in an independent living program which provides training and assistance in transitioning to living on their own.

LJC usually has the **Jackson County Jail** on their tour rotation. This year, LJC has one class member who works for the Sheriff's Office, which is also housed in the jail. LJC Board member and Chief Deputy, Dustin Steward, led the tour through the jail facility on State Road 250 in Brownstown.





Pewter Hall has been a premiere event venue in Brownstown since it was founded in 2001. In 2023, Angie Patman and her husband took over ownership and they continue to offer not only an event space for both large and small groups, but also catering and bar services. Located on State Road 235, **Medora Covered Bridge** offers visitors a chance to experience a piece of history. The bridge has been officially designated as the longest historical covered bridge in the United States and while it is no longer open to vehicle traffic, visitors are welcome to walk across this historic bridge. Did you know that Medora once had a booming brick plant that supplied bricks used to pave streets, construct university buildings, homes, and many area businesses?

Medora Brick Plant was founded in 1904 and continued production until it was officially closed in 1992. At one time, the plant property had 12 kilns, several ponds, and a number of various outbuildings that were necessary for production. Most of the kilns remain along with some small buildings, but after its closure, the Medora Brick Plant was almost completely abandoned with foliage taking over what once was a prosperous business just outside of Medora, Indiana.

In 2004, the plant was listed as one of the 10 Most Endangered Landmarks in Indiana and there are now efforts to preserve this important landmark in Indiana's industrial history. For more information, visit their website at: https://medorabrickplant.org
